Communities throughout California hold either at-large elections or district based elections. With the passage of the <u>California Voting Rights Act (CVRA)</u> in 2001, every community has an opportunity to elect candidates of their choice. The City of Turlock received a letter in 2013 from a local political community group warning of a possible CVRA violation. In response, the city council voted in June 2014 to put Measure A, a district elections measure, on the November 2014 ballot. A robust community outreach process was conducted by the city and its community partners. Turlock residents passed Measure A, approving a move to district based elections, by a large majority.
