**Re:** League 2015 Legislative Vote Records on Key City Bills

Please find enclosed a copy of the League of California Cities vote record report on key city bills for the 2015 legislative session.

City officials continue to appreciate the Governor and Legislature's disciplined approach to the state budget to ensure the state is in a better position to weather economic downturns. We also appreciate the recognition by both legislators and the Governor that identifying sufficient funds to adequately maintain our highways, local streets and roads is a problem that must be resolved. A conference committee formed during the special session on transportation continues to work on this important issue, and we eagerly await its recommendations.

In 2015, the League continued to focus on sponsoring and supporting legislation to help develop new community and economic development tools, infrastructure, affordable housing, and transportation funding. In other policy areas, the League sponsored legislation to improve the regulatory framework for medical marijuana and respond to drone interference with firefighting and other emergency responses.

Some helpful bills made it through the process and were signed into law, while others, including funding for affordable housing, stalled or were vetoed by the Governor. As always, the League defended local control on measures unduly restricting local authority or increasing costs on financially struggling cities, some of which were vetoed by the Governor.

Significant positives for the League in 2015 included the adoption of AB 2 (Alejo and Garcia), providing a new economic development tool for lower-income communities; and the passage of a medical marijuana regulatory bill package comprised of AB 266 (Bonta, Cooley, Jones-Sawyer, Lackey and Wood), AB 243 (Wood) and SB 643 (McGuire). Disappointments included the veto of AB 35 (Chiu and Atkins), which would have increased the availability of affordable housing tax credits by \$100 million.

The League compiled the final floor actions on 15 bills in the Assembly and Senate. These bills have been organized into subgroups focusing on economic development and affordable housing, medical marijuana and local control. The votes for each subgroup are reflected then combined into a final percentage. The League also provided special thanks and recognition in the report for

a number of members who provided critical assistance to the League during the legislative year. Members receiving such recognition are identified by a “SP.REC” sign next to the final vote percentage.

For informational purposes only, and not scored, in the far right column are legislator’s votes on SB 107 (Budget), the Administration’s redevelopment dissolution proposal. The votes on this measure are not scored because of the bill’s disparate effects on cities, creating winners and losers, and the lack of opportunity for cities to digest its impacts and communicate with legislators prior to the vote. The League opposed the bill over loan-repayment provisions viewed as harmful to cities. The lack of adequate process and transparency with SB 107 was also troubling. This 104-page bill surfaced on the last day of the session and was voted on quickly in the Assembly with no committee hearing. In the Senate, testimony at a Budget Committee hearing allowed significant issues to be highlighted and addressed in a letter to the Senate Journal.

Many legislators score well in the attached vote records. Thank you for your support on city issues. Some of this, no doubt, reflects the state’s improved fiscal condition, providing everyone the opportunity to move forward rather than debating cuts to vital state or local programs and services. It also reflects that legislators carried many bills this year helpful to cities or worked to address local concerns with amendments on more contentious legislation. Finally, we also hope this result reflects an improved, more collaborative, working relationship developing between legislators and city officials.

For the first time in memory, the League recognized three legislators of the year: Assembly Member Luis Alejo for his three years of hard work leading to the passage of AB 2; Assembly Member Ken Cooley for his original authorship of AB 266 and assistance overcoming obstacles with the medical marijuana regulatory package; and Senator Jim Beall for his advocacy on the transportation funding issue and underscoring the importance of local streets and roads. In October, the League Board of Directors also recognized all of the legislative authors of the medical marijuana bill package with a Distinguished Legislative Leadership Award.

City leaders and the League welcome a continued dialogue with you in 2016 about how we can continue to collaborate to better serve the people of California and our cities, advance economic development and infrastructure projects, grow jobs, and improve our environment and quality of life. We look forward to working with you in partnership to move California, its cities and residents forward.

## 2015 League Legislative Vote Records on Key City Bills

For this report the League compiled the final floor actions on 15 bills in the Assembly and Senate of significant importance to cities. These bills have been assigned to economic development and housing, medical marijuana, or local control categories. The votes on SB 107 the redevelopment dissolution bill are listed for informational purposes and not included as part of the final score. Votes consistent with the League's position are marked with a "+" sign, and those in conflict with the League's position are marked with a "-" sign. Abstentions, which can be important, are reflected with either a "NV+" or "NV-" sign. Absences due to illness or other reasons are noted with an "ABS" sign. In the past we have given legislators with five or more absences an incomplete "INC" for their total score, thus one legislator received that designation this year.

In the following section, the League also thanks and recognizes a number of members who authored important bills or provided other critical assistance to the League during the legislative year. Members receiving such recognition are identified by a "SP.REC" sign next to the final vote percentage on the vote record report.

### Special Legislative Thanks and Recognitions (In Alphabetical Order)

#### In the Assembly:

- **Assembly Member Katcho Achadjian** deserves special thanks for his authorship of AB 341, a League-sponsored bill that makes improvements to the process and timelines for cities and other local agencies to submit financial transactions reports, salary data and other reports to the Controller. The revised process will save money and time for local agencies and the state while providing more accurate data to the public.
- **Assembly Member Luis Alejo** is thanked for his three-year partnership with the League resulting in the passage of AB 2, a bill supported by a diverse coalition of stakeholders that would restore redevelopment authority for disadvantaged communities. The League also recognized him as one of its Legislators of the Year.
- **Assembly Speaker Toni Atkins** has continued to demonstrate her support for local government by identifying transportation funding as a caucus priority early in the year and leading statewide press efforts and listening sessions after the extraordinary session on transportation was called. Also appreciated is her leadership in the effort to secure additional funding for affordable housing via her AB 1335 and co-authorship of AB 35. The League also appreciates her helpful clean-up to Enhanced Infrastructure Financing District law with the passage of AB 313.
- **Assembly Member Richard Bloom** is appreciated for his continued leadership with his AB 974, following a veto of a similar bill in 2014, to permit local agencies to access bond proceeds issued by former redevelopment agencies in 2011. This provision was later incorporated into SB 107. The League also appreciates his sincere efforts to work with the League to broker compromises on other difficult issues affecting redevelopment dissolution.

- **Assembly Member Susan Bonilla** deserves thanks from the League for continuing to monitor the implementation of her AB 1147, which returned local land use authority over massage establishments. The measure also made numerous reforms and modifications to the California Massage Therapy Council; progress on those reforms will be evaluated as part of a sunset review process in 2016.
- **Assembly Member Rob Bonta** is appreciated for his collaborative work on the medical marijuana regulatory bill package. He had originally introduced another measure, but he then worked to resolve complex issues and became the lead author of AB 266. Mr. Bonta was recognized for his efforts by the League as a recipient of the Distinguished Legislative Leadership Award provided to all authors of the medical marijuana bill package.
- **Assembly Member Autumn Burke** is appreciated for her authorship of AB 1129 which assists local fire departments by clarifying data systems to be used by emergency service providers, reducing administrative costs.
- **Assembly Member David Chiu** is thanked for his leadership in attempting to secure additional funding for affordable housing tax credits with his AB 35. Despite having tremendous bi-partisan support from his colleagues and from hundreds of organizations, the bill was vetoed. Also appreciated is his strong advocacy in rejecting a bill proposing to eliminate transient occupancy tax collection on home sharing rentals.
- **Assembly Member Ken Cooley** is appreciated for his original authorship of AB 266, co-sponsored by the League and California Police Chiefs Association. Mr. Cooley's legislative experience was critical in overcoming obstacles and ensuring the successful adoption of the medical marijuana regulatory package. Mr. Cooley was recognized for his efforts by the League as one of its Legislators of the Year and also as a recipient of the Distinguished Legislative Leadership Award provided to all authors of the medical marijuana bill package.
- **Assembly Member Jim Frazier** is recognized for his assistance to cities on transportation funding. As Chair of the Assembly Transportation Committee, he promoted the principle that any new transportation funding should be split evenly between state and local transportation systems. He also operates his committee in a balanced manner and ensures that cities and counties are given equal time and position during committee hearings and negotiations. He is also appreciated for helping stop a bill that would undermine local authority over red-light cameras.
- **Assembly Member Eduardo Garcia** is thanked for his leadership on economic development issues. He was the joint author of AB 2, which returns redevelopment authority to disadvantaged communities. The League also worked closely with his office to support his AB 185 which would have established a California New Markets Tax Credit Program.
- **Assembly Member Mike Gatto** is thanked for his principled opposition throughout the year to the Administration's proposed changes to redevelopment dissolution laws that sought to overturn Court decisions, including one that his city of Glendale had won. The issues involved in the Glendale case had bearing on many cities.
- **Assembly Member Richard Gordon** merits recognition in several areas. He has been a longtime ally of city' efforts to improve stormwater management. At the request of the League and other local government groups, he introduced AB 1362 to provide cities greater flexibility to fund important stormwater programs and projects. The bill was later

held for the year to allow more time to finalize key provisions. Mr. Gordon is also appreciated for his principled work on the Local Government Committee.

- **Assembly Member Reginald Jones-Sawyer** is thanked for his contributions to the medical marijuana regulatory package. Mr. Jones-Sawyer worked to ensure that individuals with convictions for marijuana-related activities, now made legal, could access employment opportunities, and that the final package was compatible with a City of Los Angeles' voter-approved ballot measure. Mr. Jones-Sawyer was recognized for his efforts by the League as a recipient of the Distinguished Legislative Leadership Award provided to all authors of the medical marijuana bill package.
- **Assembly Member Tom Lackey** merits thanks for his bipartisan role in shaping the medical marijuana regulatory bill package. As a former member of the California Highway Patrol, Mr. Lackey made sure the package contained a provision equipping law enforcement with tools to address drugged driving from marijuana consumption. Mr. Lackey was recognized for his efforts by the League as a recipient of the Distinguished Legislative Leadership Award provided to all authors of the medical marijuana bill package.
- **Assembly Member Brian Maienschein** is thanked for his support, both as Chair of the Assembly Local Government Committee and on the Assembly Floor, for a restoration of the redevelopment tool for disadvantaged areas within cities in AB 2, despite arguments from opponents who did not want the tool restored.
- **Assembly Member Chad Mayes** is thanked for his policy-focused efforts to engage the League in the development of his AB 851, which updated the Local Agency Formation Commission process for addressing disincorporation issues. The League participated in a stakeholder process as the legislation was refined and supported the final version, which also extended a sunset date on existing law that authorizes a city-county mediation process to handle disputes over proposed annexations.
- **Assembly Member Marc Steinorth** is thanked for his support as Vice-Chair of the Assembly Housing Committee, as well as on the Floor, for a restoration of the redevelopment tool for disadvantaged areas within cities in AB 2, despite arguments from opponents who did not want the tool restored.
- **Assembly Member Jim Wood** merits thanks for his bipartisan role in shaping the medical marijuana regulatory bill package. Mr. Wood brought to bear his passion to address environmental degradation in California's North Coastal region resulting from illegal water diversion and pesticide use associated with marijuana cultivation, and an understanding of the urgent need to provide statewide regulation of widespread, unlicensed and sometimes illicit cultivation activity. Mr. Wood was recognized for his efforts by the League as a recipient of the Distinguished Legislative Leadership Award provided to all authors of the medical marijuana bill package.

#### **In the Senate:**

- **Senator Ben Allen** is thanked for his work as Chair of the Senate Elections Committee and concern for legislation that would unduly limit local authority.
- **Senator Jim Beall** was recognized by the League as one of its 2015 Legislators of the Year for his advocacy on the transportation funding issue and underscoring the importance of local streets and roads.

- **Senator Tom Berryhill** is thanked for his strong voting record on city issues in 2015, scoring 93%.
- **Senator Anthony Cannella** is thanked for his assistance to the state's smaller cities considering conversion to district elections with his SB 493, support for retaining local land use authority as Vice Chair of the Senate Transportation and Housing Committee and advocacy on the Senate Floor for new local redevelopment authority with AB 2.
- **Senator Ted Gaines** is thanked for his leadership and efforts to protect public safety response operations from interference by drone operators with his authorship of SB 168 which was co-sponsored by the League and California Police Chiefs Association.
- **Senator Steve Glazer** is thanked for his careful consideration of local government issues and protecting local flexibility and authority. Senator Glazer was the only legislator in 2015 to have a voting record on legislation listed in this report that was 100 percent consistent with the League's position.
- **Senator Bob Huff** is recognized for his consistent concern for local government issues reflected in his advocacy on the on the Senate Floor for the return of local redevelopment authority with AB 2, and refusal to vote for measures that would undermine local authority. In 2015, Senator Huff scored 93%.
- **Senator Mike McGuire** is thanked for his support for local government issues throughout the year, including efforts to assist local agencies in their efforts to regulate and collect transient occupancy taxes from temporary home sharing rentals and leadership on medical marijuana including addressing environmental degradation associated with marijuana cultivation. Senator McGuire was recognized for his efforts by the League as a recipient of the Distinguished Legislative Leadership Award provided to all authors of the medical marijuana bill package.
- **Senator Fran Pavley** is thanked for her strong voting record on city issues in 2015, scoring 93%.
- **Senator Richard Roth** is thanked for helping the League get amendments to SB 122, to remove provisions that would have created serious delays in the CEQA process for lead agencies. Also appreciated is his assistance in ensuring that the Department of Finance's statement that the loan repayment caps in SB 107 were per-loan, and not a cumulative total, was addressed in a letter filed in the Senate Journal. Senator Roth also had a very strong voting record on city issues, scoring 93%.
- **Senator Jeff Stone** is thanked for his eloquent floor statement on SB 107, the redevelopment dissolution bill, raising concerns about the expedited process by which the 104-page bill was being brought for a vote, the potential for creating winners and losers among cities, and insufficient time for cities to review and comment on the proposal.
- **Senator Lois Wolk** is appreciated for her principled opposition to Administration-proposed changes to the redevelopment dissolution process that were inconsistent the representations made to local agencies when the law was established three years prior when she served as Chair of the Senate Governance and Finance Committee.

## **Some Comments and Cautions on Vote Records for City Officials and Others**

- 1) The most powerful tool legislators have is their votes, and they should be held accountable for them, with certain caveats. Legislators that score well should be thanked for their efforts and attention to city issues. Yet the challenge with vote records is that a sampling of legislative floor votes does not always provide the full story. For example, the League lobbied on many bills that are not on this list. Some bills were stopped in committees; others were amended to remove concerns. A legislator may have helped on a budget issue or in committee or in behind-the-scenes efforts to secure a helpful amendment or broker a compromise. A legislator may have sponsored legislation or voted on other measures important to their city not reflected in this listing. The League has highlighted other actions by providing special recognitions.
- 2) The bills on this list are a representative sample of some of the major bills of importance to the League. Keep the relative importance of these bills and how they affect your community in mind. For some cities a vote to address redevelopment dissolution or on legislation that restores or removes aspects of local control may outweigh the importance of other bills on the list. There also may be bills important to your city that are not on this list.
- 3) Protecting local control and revenue in the legislature usually means opposing or seeking amendments on bills backed by powerful interests. Thus “No” votes and abstentions on bills the League is opposed to provide significant benefit and often carry more weight.
- 4) Democrats author all but two of the bills on this list. A simple majority can pass the budget, and Democrats have a numerical majority that controls the flow of legislation on all committees. Few Republican-authored bills make it through the process. All bills on the list only required a majority vote. Democrats have 26 out of 40 seats in the Senate and 52 out of 80 seats in the Assembly. This means that the Democrat majority can pass bills without needing Republican votes. It also means that not all Democrats need to vote for bills.

### **Ways to Use This Document:**

- Have a conversation with your legislator about the 2015 Session, and include the vote record as part of that conversation. If your legislator has a good record, thank them. Consider passing a resolution of commendation. They deserve it.
- If your legislator’s vote record is weak, ask them why. Members often try to find ways of helping while avoiding bucking leadership or a powerful sponsor. Ask your legislator what else you should take into account.
- Evaluate the conversation. Is there a reliable commitment for a continued or *improved* level of responsiveness to their city’s issues?
- For elected city officials that provide legislative endorsements, consider whether or not the legislator merits your support. With the top-two primary, these endorsements are more valuable than ever.

## Legislation Included on League 2015 Vote Record

### Legislation Supported by the League

#### **[AB 2 \(Alejo and Garcia\): Community Revitalization and Investment Authorities](#)**

Authorizes the creation of a new entity at the local level called a Community Revitalization Investment Authority that would provide a redevelopment option for the most disadvantaged and poorest areas of our state. Signed by Governor.

#### **[AB 35 \(Chiu, Atkins\): Housing Tax Credit](#)**

Proposed to increase the state's Low-Income Housing Tax Credit from \$70 to \$170 million annually for five years, providing an additional \$500 million to a program that is always heavily oversubscribed. Vetoed by Governor.

#### **[AB 243 \(Wood\): Medical Marijuana](#)**

Requires: licensing and regulation of marijuana cultivation under the Department of Food and Agriculture (DFA); the Department of Pesticide Regulation to develop related standards for pesticides and other foreign object residue, including maximum tolerances; and the Department of Public Health to develop standards for production and labelling of marijuana edibles. This bill also assigns joint responsibility to DFA, the Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) and the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) to prevent illegal water diversion associated with marijuana cultivation from adversely affecting California fish population. The bill also directs a multi-agency task force (DFW-SWRCB) to expand existing enforcement efforts to a statewide level to reduce adverse environmental impacts such as illegal discharge into waterways and poisoning of marine life and habitats. Signed by Governor.

#### **[AB 266 \(Bonta, Cooley, Jones-Sawyer, Lackey, Wood\): Medical Marijuana](#)**

Protects local control as it establishes statewide medical marijuana regulatory scheme. Under the bill, state regulation is led by the Bureau of Marijuana Regulation within Department of Consumer Affairs. The bill provides for dual licensing: the state will issue licenses, while local governments will issue permits or licenses to operate marijuana businesses, according to local ordinances. This legislation also requires establishment of uniform health and safety standards, testing standards, and security requirements at dispensaries and during transport of the product. Signed by Governor.

#### **[AB 313 \(Atkins\): Enhanced Infrastructure Finance District: Cleanup](#)**

Makes various improvements to the Enhanced Infrastructure Finance District tool to facilitate implementation. Signed by Governor.

#### **[SB 168 \(Gaines, Jackson\): Unmanned Aircraft Systems](#)**

Proposed to provide first-responder immunity for damage to drones interfering with firefighting, airborne or ground ambulances and search-and-rescue operations. The measure



also would have increased fines for violating existing laws prohibiting operations in flight-restricted airspace during emergencies. Vetoed by Governor.

**[SB 321 \(Beall\): Motor Vehicle Fuel Taxes: Adjustments](#)**

Proposed to make a much needed technical fix to the complex process for setting the gasoline excise tax rate under the gas tax swap by allowing for semiannual adjustments if actual prices vary drastically from prior estimates, while maintaining revenue neutrality with the former sales tax on gasoline. This measure was ultimately held in the Legislature to await the development of the transportation funding package in the Special Session.

**[SB 485 \(Hernandez\): County of L.A. Sanitation Districts](#)**

Authorizes sanitation districts in Los Angeles County to acquire, construct, operate, maintain and furnish facilities for the diversion, management, and treatment of stormwater and dry weather runoff. Signed by Governor.

**[SB 493 \(Cannella\): Elections in Cities: By or From Districts](#)**

Authorizes a city council of a city with a population less than 100,000 to adopt an ordinance to switch the election system from at-large to by-district. Signed by Governor.

**[SB 643 \(McGuire\): Medical Marijuana](#)**

Imposes fines of up to \$5,000 against physicians for violating the prohibition against having a financial interest in a marijuana business. Recommendations for cannabis without a prior examination would constitute unprofessional conduct. This bill also: imposes restrictions on advertising for physician recommendations; places the Department of Food and Agriculture in charge of cultivation regulations and licensing, and requires a track-and-trace program; itemizes disqualifying felonies for state licensure; places the Department of Pesticide Regulation in charge of pesticide regulation and Department of Public Health in charge of production and labelling of edibles; and upholds local power to levy fees and taxes. Signed by Governor.

**Legislation Opposed by the League:**

**[AB 57 \(Quirk\): Wireless Telecom Facilities](#)**

Deems approved any application for colocation or siting of a new wireless telecommunications facility if a city or county fails to approve or disapprove the application within time periods that the Federal Communications Commission established. Signed by Governor.

**[AB 305 \(Gonzalez\): Workers' Compensation: Permanent Disability Apportionment](#)**

AB 305 would prohibit apportionment of a permanent disability claim in the case of a physical injury from being based on: pregnancy (or menopause if the condition is contemporaneous with the claimed physical injury) or psychiatric injury occurring on or from being based on psychiatric disability or impairment caused by sexual harassment. Vetoed by Governor.

**AB 718 (Chu): Parking Enforcement**

Would have undermined authority for local agencies to enforce local parking ordinances against people sleeping or resting in vehicles. Failed Passage on Senate Floor.

**AB 744 (Chau): Density Bonus-Parking**

Undermines local control and exacerbates parking spillover from new development by establishing unrealistically low parking ratios for various affordable housing projects. Local governments can avoid the unrealistic parking criteria based upon a parking study. Signed by Governor.

**SB 107 (Budget): RDA Dissolution**

Makes numerous changes to redevelopment dissolution laws and came into print and was approved the last day of the session, and contains provisions both beneficial and harmful to local agencies. The League raised concerns with provisions related to the repayment of city loans. A letter to the Senate Journal was submitted to clarify aspects, and future effects will depend on Department of Finance interpretation and implementation. Signed by Governor.
