**Re:** League 2016 Legislative Vote Records on Key City Bills

Please find enclosed a copy of the League of California Cities vote record report on key city bills for the 2016 legislative session.

City officials support the Governor and Legislature's disciplined approach to the state budget to ensure the state is in a stronger position to weather economic downturns. Fiscal stability at the state level reduces uncertainty and has many positive benefits for our economy. Also appreciated is the recognition by both legislators and the Governor of the crisis in transportation infrastructure and a consensus on the necessity of identifying the financial resources to adequately maintain our highways and local streets and roads; this is a problem that must be resolved. We remain hopeful that an agreement on a transportation funding package can be forged in the near future.

While many League-supported efforts to restore affordable housing resources (including additional tax credits; a one-time budget allocation; a proposed housing bond; and dedicating some of the state's savings from redevelopment elimination or efforts to identify a permanent source) were unsuccessful, we appreciate the successful effort to establish the creative No Place Like Home program to provide badly needed resources to help house the homeless.

In 2016, the League also continued to focus on advancing legislation to expand and refine local economic development tools. Another priority was providing cities with flexibility and protection from excessive legal fees when they are in the process of shifting from at-large to district elections to comply with the requirements of the California Voting Rights Act.

Additional helpful bills made it through the process and were signed into law, while others stalled or were vetoed by the Governor. As always, the League defended local control on measures perceived as unduly restricting local authority or increasing costs on financially struggling cities, some of which were vetoed by the Governor.

For the 2016 session, the League compiled the final floor actions on 11 bills in the Assembly and Senate. These bills have been organized into subgroups focusing on economic development and affordable housing, city-supported measures to ease implementation of the CVRA and local control. The votes for each category are reflected then combined into a final percentage. The League also provided special thanks and recognition in the report for members who provided critical assistance to the League during the legislative year. Members receiving such recognition are identified by a “SP.REC” sign next to the final vote percentage.

Many legislators score well in the attached vote records. Thank you for your support on city issues. Some of this, no doubt, reflects the state’s continued improved fiscal condition, providing the opportunity to move forward rather than debating cuts to vital state or local programs and services. It also reflects that legislators carried many bills helpful to cities or worked to address local concerns with amendments on contentious legislation. Finally, we also hope this result reflects an improved, more collaborative, working relationship developing between legislators and city officials.

California will face challenges in the coming year. City leaders and the League look forward to working with you to serve the people of California and our cities, advance economic development, infrastructure projects, affordable housing, grow jobs, and improve our environment and quality of life. We look forward to working with you in partnership to continue to move California, its cities, and residents forward.

## 2016 League Legislative Vote Records on Key City Bills

For this report the League compiled the final floor actions on 11 bills in the Assembly and Senate of significant importance to cities. These bills have been assigned to economic development and housing, assisting city implementation of the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA), or local control categories. Votes consistent with the League's position are marked with a "+" sign, and those in conflict with the League's position are marked with a "-" sign. Abstentions, which can be important, are reflected with either a "NV+" or "NV-" sign. Absences due to illness or other reasons are noted with an "ABS" sign. Legislators with four or more absences receive an incomplete "INC" for their total score, thus one legislator received that designation this year. The record for Senator Runner, who was always a strong supporter of local government and regrettably missed votes due to illness, has been reflected as "N/A."

In the following section, the League also thanks and recognizes a number of members who authored important bills or provided other critical assistance to the League during the legislative year. Members receiving such recognition are identified by a "SP.REC" sign next to the final vote percentage on the vote record report.

### Special Legislative Thanks and Recognitions (In Alphabetical Order)

#### In the Assembly

- **Assembly Member Katcho Achadjian** deserves our thanks and recognition for his service in the Assembly and concern for local government during his term as chair of the Assembly Local Government Committee, and work with the League on various bills.
- **Assembly Member Luis Alejo** is thanked for his work with the League on AB 2492, a clean-up measure to Community Revitalization Investment Authority law. Also appreciated is his work on AB 350, helping forge consensus between the League and key stakeholders to develop "notice and cure" provisions to protect cities from excessive attorney fees while they adjust their election process for CVRA compliance.
- **Assembly Speaker Emeritus Toni Atkins** is thanked for establishing transportation funding as a caucus priority that continues in the special session established during her term as Speaker. We also appreciate her continued efforts to identify new sources of funds for affordable housing including AB 2734, which proposed the state to dedicate half of its budgetary savings from redevelopment elimination for affordable housing.
- **Assembly Member Catherine Baker** is thanked for her work on the floor providing important support on the CVRA bills, AB 350 and AB 2220, and speaking against AB 650 (Low) which would pre-empt local authority over taxi regulation and that the Governor vetoed.
- **Assembly Member Richard Bloom** is appreciated for his authorship of AB 2403 (Bloom) to address the overconcentration of alcohol and drug recovery facilities in residential neighborhoods; regrettably that measure was held in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.
- **Assembly Member Autumn Burke** is appreciated for her authorship of AB 2722, which establishes the new Transformative Climate Communities Program (TCCP), under the cap-and-trade program, that provides funding to develop and implement neighborhood-level climate community plans in disadvantaged communities. This program is similar to proposals the League and other local government stakeholders have advocated for over the past three years to get more resources to local communities.
- **Assembly Member David Chiu** is thanked for his tenacious leadership in attempting to secure additional funding for affordable housing tax credits with his AB 2817, which would have boosted affordable housing tax credits by \$300 million annually. In addition, Mr. Chiu helped lead a League-supported effort by his caucus to secure \$1.3 billion in budget surplus funds for

a one-time boost for affordable housing. Mr. Chiu is also appreciated for raising concerns with SB 1170, which would have increased costs for public agencies to comply with stormwater pollution prevention plans.

- **Assembly Member Ken Cooley** is appreciated for his continued leadership on issues important to local governments and thoughtful role as a member of the Assembly Local Government Committee. This year he authored AB 2228, co-sponsored by the League and California Association of Code Enforcement Officers to develop and maintain standards for the code enforcement profession. Mr. Cooley also helped forge consensus between local governments, law enforcement, the fire services, and the medical marijuana industry in crafting AB 2679, which expands research activities on the effects of marijuana on motor skills and provides interim guidance on manufacturing processes.
- **Assembly Member Susan Talamantes Eggman** is appreciated for her principled leadership and respect for local control as the new chair of the Assembly Committee on Local Government. This year, Ms. Eggman played pivotal roles in ensuring that amendments were drafted to protect local authority over drone regulation, preserving local PACE programs to finance energy improvements, supporting efforts to assist cities in implementing the CVRA, and helping stop an effort to shift liability from contractors to public agencies on stormwater pollution prevention plans.
- **Assembly Member Jim Frazier** is thanked for his continued leadership as Chair of the Assembly Transportation Committee in the effort to produce a transportation funding package, including crafting his AB X1-26, and helping coordinate the issue within his caucus and with Senator Beall, his counterpart in the Senate. He operates his committee in a balanced manner and ensures that cities and counties are given equal time during committee hearings and negotiations.
- **Assembly Member Beth Gaines** is thanked for being the lone Assembly Member to raise issues with the final revised version of AB 779 (C. Garcia), which would have imposed duplicative compensation reporting requirements on local elected officials that are already required to be provided annually to the State Controller and listed on a local agency's website. The Governor vetoed the bill for similar reasons.
- **Assembly Member Eduardo Garcia** is thanked for his continued leadership on economic development issues. He was the joint author of the AB 2492, the League's sponsored clean-up bill to AB 2, which returned redevelopment authority to disadvantaged communities. The League also appreciates his efforts to expand investment opportunities for lower income communities by proposing to create a California New Markets Tax Credit program and extend the duration and increase funding for the California Organized Investment Network (COIN) program in AB 2647.
- **Assembly Member Mike Gatto** is thanked for his principled opposition in the Assembly Privacy and Consumer Protection Committee to a proposal to pre-empt local authority over drone regulation in AB 2320 (Calderon and Low). Despite pressure from proponents Mr. Gatto refused to budge from his "No" vote. This helped set the stage for later removing the pre-emption language in the Assembly Local Government Committee. Mr. Gatto also authored and the Governor signed AB 2853, which reduces costs for compliance with public records requests by authorizing local agencies to direct a requestor to information posted on the agency's website.
- **Assembly Member Richard Gordon** merits recognition for his thoughtful and principled approach as a member of the Assembly Local Government Committee. Continuing his work on stormwater, he was poised to introduce a constitutional amendment if the alternative process for financing water infrastructure developed by the League, California Association of Counties and Association of California Water Agencies proved viable. In a related effort, AB 2594 (Gordon) clarifies that a public entity that captures stormwater before the water reaches a

natural channel may use the captured water. Also, the League appreciates his defense of extended producer responsibility principles to help divert waste from landfills in stakeholder discussions, and helping eliminate an effort to pre-empt local regulatory authority over drones.

- **Assembly Member Kevin Mullin** is thanked for his efforts to provide additional authority for local agencies to ensure the construction of affordable housing with inclusionary zoning by crafting a fix to the 2009' Palmer court decision with his AB 2502. Unfortunately, that measure failed to move out of the Assembly.
- **Assembly Member Adrin Nazarian** is appreciated for speaking strongly on the floor in opposition to AB 650 (Low) which would have preempted local authority over taxi regulation and that the Governor vetoed.
- **Assembly Member Jay Obernolte** is thanked for his open door policy and thoughtfulness as the Legislature negotiates a transportation funding package. He has accepted every meeting request from the League on this issue, and it is evident that he spends significant time researching the background and trying to find a consensus proposal.
- **Assembly Member Kristin Olsen** is appreciated for her assistance on the floor with the passage of the CVRA implementation bills helpful to cities AB 2220 and AB 350. Also appreciated is Ms. Olsen's dedication to improving legislative transparency by establishing a three-day print rule with her ACA 1. While that measure never moved in the Legislature, the voters had an opportunity to adopt Prop. 54 which contained similar provisions.
- **Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon** is appreciated for continuing to make transportation funding a caucus priority as Speaker and his concern for the importance of local planning, public input and environmental protection in land use decisions when evaluating the Governor's "by right" housing proposal.
- **Assembly Member Freddie Rodriguez** is thanked for carrying League-sponsored AB 2321, which was designed to improve the allocation of local sales tax by the Board of Equalization from private vehicle and vessel sales to the jurisdictions where the new owner resides. Unfortunately, the measure was held in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.
- **Assembly Member Marc Steinorth** is thanked for his leadership in advancing incentive-based responses to the state's housing challenges with his authorship of AB 1969 to allocate \$10 million to assist individuals purchase new housing in jurisdictions that have reduced various regulatory barriers, and AB 1736, to provide a state income tax deduction for amounts saved by lower income households in homeownership savings accounts. Regrettably, both bills were held in the Assembly Appropriations committee.
- **Assembly Member Jim Wood** is thanked for his leadership in quickly drafting and securing passage on an urgency basis of AB 21, to remove an unintended March 1, 2016, deadline in the 2015 medical marijuana regulatory package. The date had raised concerns that local governments would need to adopt cultivation ordinances by that date or face state pre-emption. Mr. Wood, as Chair of the Assembly Health Committee, is also appreciated for assisting with the passage of AB 2403 (Bloom) to address the overconcentration of alcohol and drug recovery facilities in residential neighborhoods; regrettably that measure was held in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

## **In the Senate**

- **Senator Ben Allen** is thanked for his work as Chair of the Senate Elections Committee helping forge consensus for various pending measures affecting the CVRA this year, including AB 2220 (Cooper), AB 350 (Alejo) and AB 278 (Hernández). The Senator is also appreciated for supporting efforts to get more resources for local agencies to assist the homeless and resisting proposals that sought to undermine local efforts to appropriately manage public and private spaces.

- **Senator Patricia Bates** is thanked for her efforts to provide local agencies with more flexibility when dealing with sober living homes in residential neighborhoods with SB 1283 that was unfortunately held in committee, and helping stop AB 2873 (Thurmond) on the Senate Floor, which would have imposed excessive and unnecessary mandates on local code enforcement agencies.
- **Senator Jim Beall** is thanked for his continued efforts to forge agreement on a transportation funding package with his SB X1-1, advocacy for a housing bond, and his concern for the importance of local planning, public input and environmental protections in land use decisions when evaluating the Governor's "by right" housing proposal.
- **Senator Anthony Cannella** is thanked for his continued support for retaining local land use authority as Vice Chair of the Senate Transportation and Housing Committee, including resisting proposals that sought to undermine local efforts to appropriately manage the impacts of the homeless in public and private spaces, while supporting funding to help build needed housing. Mr. Cannella continued to support returning local tax increment tools with League-sponsored AB 2492 (Alejo), and assist cities on CVRA issues by acting as the Senate floor manager for AB 2220 (Cooper) and supporting AB 350 (Alejo).
- **Senator Kevin de León** is thanked for his leadership on efforts to provide housing to help house the homeless mentally ill with his No Place Like Home measure which will provide \$2 billion in funding and help construct 10,000 units with services. The League recognized Senator de León as its 2016 Legislator of the Year for his efforts.
- **Senator Ted Gaines** is thanked for his leadership and efforts to protect public safety response operations from interference by drone operators with his authorship of SB 807 which was co-sponsored by the League and California Police Chiefs Association. The Governor signed the measure.
- **Senator Steve Glazer** is thanked for his careful consideration of local government issues and protecting local flexibility and authority. For the second year in a row, Senator Glazer has an outstanding voting record on League priority bills. In 2015, he was the only legislator 100% consistent with the League's position, and in 2016, he would have had another 100% score; however, he mistakenly cast a vote in favor of SB 1069. The Senator followed up with a letter to the Governor requesting a veto. Senator Glazer has established himself as a great defender of local authority and flexibility.
- **Senator Bob Huff** is thanked for his consistent concern for local government issues over his terms as a Senator and Senate Republican Leader.
- **Senator Hannah-Beth Jackson** is thanked for her efforts to craft a state structure for drone regulation that would preserve local authority to address issues consistent with local priorities. Also, the League appreciates her defense of extended producer responsibility principles to help divert waste from landfills in stakeholder discussions.
- **Senator Connie Leyva** is thanked for her work with the League to include amendments mitigating concerns with her SB 1000, which requires environmental justice issues to be addressed in general plans. The Senator is also appreciated for supporting efforts to get more resources for local agencies to assist the homeless and resisting proposals that sought to undermine local efforts to appropriately manage public and private spaces.
- **Senator Mike McGuire** is thanked for his support for local government issues throughout the year, including continued efforts to forge compromise over proposals to assist local governments regulate and collect transient occupancy taxes from temporary home sharing rentals. Also appreciated is his resistance to proposals that would undermine local efforts to appropriately manage the impacts of the homeless in public and private spaces, while supporting funding to help build needed housing, and for working with the League to retain flexibility for local taxation authority of medical marijuana in his SB 987.

- **Senator Tony Mendoza** is thanked for listening to concerns raised by his local officials and resisting proposals that would undermine local efforts to appropriately manage the impacts of the homeless in public and private spaces, while supporting funding to help build needed housing. Also appreciated is the Senator's vote against AB 2586, which would have undermined local parking regulation authority.
- **Senator Holly Mitchell** is thanked for her careful consideration of matters affecting local control when casting floor votes, resulting in a strong voting record on city issues in 2016, scoring 100%.
- **Senator Richard Roth** is thanked for his continued efforts to restore needed funding to four recently-incorporated cities in his district with his SB 817. These communities, and many others, lost funding from vehicle license fees with the passage of SB 89 in 2011. Regrettably, the Governor vetoed the measure. Also appreciated is the Senator's resistance to proposals that would undermine local efforts to appropriately manage the impacts of the homeless in public and private spaces, while supporting funding to help build needed housing.

### **Some Comments and Cautions on Vote Records for City Officials and Others**

1. The most powerful tool legislators have is their votes, and they should be held accountable for them, with certain caveats. Legislators that score well should be thanked for their efforts and attention to city issues. Yet the challenge with vote records is that a sampling of legislative floor votes does not always provide the full story. For example, the League lobbied on many bills that are not on this list. Some bills were stopped in committees; others were amended to remove concerns. A legislator may have helped on a budget issue or in committee or in behind-the-scenes efforts to secure a helpful amendment or broker a compromise. A legislator may have sponsored legislation or voted on other measures important to their city not reflected in this listing. The League has highlighted other actions by providing special recognitions.
2. The bills on this list are a representative sample of some of the major bills of importance to the League. Keep the relative importance of these bills and how they affect your community in mind. For some cities a vote to address affordable housing funding or on legislation that restores or removes aspects of local control may outweigh the importance of other bills on the list. There also may be important bills for your city not on this list.
3. Protecting local control and revenue in the legislature usually means opposing or seeking amendments on bills backed by powerful interests. Thus "No" votes and abstentions on bills the League is opposed to provide significant benefit and often carry more weight.
4. Democrats author all but one of the bills on this list. A simple majority can pass the budget, and Democrats have a numerical majority that controls the flow of legislation on all committees. Few Republican-authored bills make it through the process. All bills on the list only required a majority vote. Democrats have 26 out of 40 seats in the Senate and 52 out of 80 seats in the Assembly. This means that the Democrat majority can pass bills without needing Republican votes. It also means that not all Democrats need to vote for bills.

### **Ways to Use This Document**

- Have a conversation with your legislator about the 2016 Session, and include the vote record as part of that conversation. If your legislator has a good record, thank them. Consider passing a resolution of commendation. They deserve it.

- If your legislator's vote record is weak, ask them why. Members often try to find ways of helping while avoiding bucking leadership or a powerful sponsor. Ask your legislator what else you should take into account.
- Evaluate the conversation. Is there a reliable commitment for a continued or improved level of responsiveness to their city's issues?
- For elected city officials that provide legislative endorsements, consider whether or not the legislator merits your support. With the top-two primary, these endorsements are more valuable than ever.

## **Legislation Included on League 2016 Vote Record**

### **Legislation Supported by the League**

#### **AB 350 (Alejo) California Voting Rights Act: Notice and Cure**

Provides a 'notice and cure' provision for cities who are being sued under the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA). This measure would give cities 135 days to switch to district-based elections through the ordinance process without the fear of soaring legal fees. Signed by Governor.

#### **AB 806 (Dodd and Frazier) Economic Development**

Clarifies loan, lease and sale agreements and property acquisition are included in the range of options a community may employ to advance economic development. Provides additional flexibility for local agencies to acquire and dispose of properties to create economic opportunities. Signed by Governor.

#### **AB 1618 (Budget) Homeless Housing Construction**

Establishes the No Place Like Home Program to further the development of permanent supportive housing for persons who are in need of mental health services and are homeless, chronically homeless, or at risk of homelessness, to be funded by \$2 billion in revenue bonds to produce an estimated 10,000 new housing units with services. Signed by Governor.

#### **AB 2220 (Cooper) District-Based Elections**

This is a simple expansion of SB 493 (Cannella, 2015) which will allow cities with a population threshold over 100K to switch to districts via the ordinance process versus the ballot. Ballot initiatives are costly and do not insulate a city from CVRA litigation if the measure fails. Signed by Governor

#### **AB 2228 (Cooley) Code Enforcement**

Establishes the Code Enforcement Officers Standards Act to develop and maintain standards for the designation of Certified Code Enforcement Officers. Signed by Governor.

#### **AB 2492 (Alejo and E. Garcia) Cleanup to CRIA Law**

Contains helpful changes for implementation of last year's AB 2 Community Revitalization and Investment Authorities (CRIAs), including clarifying method for calculating crime and unemployment data, authorizing use of countywide and citywide income data, authorizing additional financing options available to enhanced infrastructure financing districts, and facilitating disadvantaged communities' use of the tool. Signed by Governor.

#### **SB 807 (Gaines) Drones: Interference with Emergency Operations**

Grants explicit immunity to first responders for local governments if they damage or destroy a drone that is interfering with their emergency operations. Signed by Governor.



## **Legislation Opposed by the League**

### **AB 650 (Low) Taxicab Transportation Services**

Makes preemptory changes in anticipation of the expected reorganization of the California Public Utilities Commission (PUC) that would remove transportation companies from the PUC's regulatory authority. Except for the city and county of San Francisco, would limit city/county service fees, cap taxi driver permit fees at \$75, and prevent expansion or adoption of ordinances that help ensure adequate levels of disability access if those policies were not in place by July 1, 2016. Cities and counties would still have to perform all other regulatory functions that are required of them, such as background checks and drug and alcohol testing, until the PUC is reorganized. Vetoed by Governor.

### **AB 2586 (Gatto) Parking**

Permanently deletes the Jan. 1, 2017 sunset on AB 61 (Gatto, Chapter 71, 2013), which prohibits cities from ticketing cars at broken meters. Also requires that cities make parking promptly available once street sweeping and other maintenance activities have been provided and prohibits cities from providing incentives when contracting out for private parking enforcement. Vetoed by Governor.

### **SB 1069 (Wieckowski) Land Use: Zoning**

Restricts a local agency's ability to impose requirements on second units (renamed "accessory dwelling units" or ADUs). Prohibits local agencies from imposing parking standards on units that are within one half mile of public transit, located within an architecturally and historically significant district, or when there is a car share vehicle within one block; among other conditions. Also places confusing restrictions on the water/sewer connection and capacity fees. Signed by Governor.

### **SB 1387 (de León) Composition of SCAQMD Board**

Proposed to add three additional state-appointed voting board members to the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD). Defeated on Assembly Floor.
