Re: League 2017 Legislative Vote Records on Key City Bills

Please find enclosed a copy of the League of California Cities vote record report on key city bills for the 2017 legislative session.

In 2017, securing additional road maintenance funding was a top city priority. For over a decade, city officials and residents witnessed the continued deterioration of their streets and roads. The primary source of local maintenance funding – the per-gallon gas tax – was last increased in the 1990s with no inflation index. Fuel efficiency improvements have reduced overall consumption, and electrical and hybrid vehicles have not contributed equitably to road maintenance. The League thanks legislators and the Governor for their leadership in recognizing and addressing this growing problem in a comprehensive manner.

As always, protecting local authority is a cornerstone issue for the League. The League and over 300 cities opposed SB 649, the wireless equipment siting measure, viewing it as an aggressive undermining of local authority to manage their public property. This was a core local control vote and the League appreciates legislators who voted “no” or abstained. Thankfully, the Governor also viewed the measure as an overreach and vetoed the measure stating: *“I believe that the interest which localities have in managing rights-of-way requires a more balanced solution than the one achieved in this bill.”*

The remainder of the vote record is divided between key housing legislation and other legislation. SB 2 (Atkins) and SB 3 (Beall) are especially appreciated by cities for providing funding for affordable housing.

In this report, the League compiled votes on thirteen bills from final Assembly and Senate floor actions. These bills are assigned to three categories: transportation and core local control; the housing package; and other legislation. Votes consistent with the League’s position are marked with a “+” sign, and those in conflict with the League’s position are marked with a “-” sign. Abstentions, which can be important, are reflected with either a “NV+” or “NV-” sign. Absences due to illness or other reasons are reflected with an “ABS” sign. Assembly Member Jimmy Gomez was elected to Congress mid-year so his votes on two bills are recorded with the remainder receiving an “N/A.” Senator Gaines was absent during the last day and night of session due to a family obligation, and Senator Berryhill was absent due to illness, so both are

given an incomplete “INC” for their total score. The votes on SB 1, ACA 5 and SB 649 are weighted for a combined 40 percent, reflecting the increased significance of these measures to cities.

We recognize that final floor votes represent only a snapshot in a complex political process with thousands of bills and many committee votes and amendments throughout the year, so we also include appropriate cautions for city officials.

This was a year of significant progress on transportation funding, affordable housing and park/water bond funding. Many legislators score well in the attached vote records. 2017 League Legislative Vote Records on Key City Bills

In this report, the League compiled votes on thirteen bills from final Assembly and Senate floor actions. These bills are assigned to three categories: transportation and core local control; the housing package; and other legislation. Votes consistent with the League's position are marked with a "+" sign, and those in conflict with the League's position are marked with a "-" sign. Thankfully, the Governor also viewed the measure as an overreach and vetoed the measure stating: *"I believe that the interest which localities have in managing rights-of-way requires a more balanced solution than the one achieved in this bill."*

The remainder of the vote record is divided between key housing legislation and other legislation. SB 2 (Atkins) and SB 3 (Beall) are especially appreciated by cities for providing funding for affordable housing.

Some Comments and Cautions on Vote Records for City Officials and Others

1. The most powerful tool legislators have is their votes, and they should be held accountable for them, with certain caveats. Legislators that score well should be thanked for their efforts and attention to city issues. Yet the challenge with vote records is that a sampling of legislative floor votes does not always provide the full story. For example, the League lobbied on many bills that are not on this list. Some bills were stopped in committees; others were amended to remove concerns. A legislator may have helped on a budget issue or in committee or in behind-the-scenes efforts to secure a helpful amendment or broker a compromise. A legislator may have sponsored legislation or voted on other measures important to their city not reflected in this listing.

2. The bills on this list are a representative sample of the major bills of importance to the League. Keep the relative importance of these bills and how they affect your community in mind. For some cities a vote to address affordable housing funding or on legislation that restores or removes aspects of local control may outweigh the importance of other bills on the list. There also may be important bills for your city not on this list.
3. Protecting local control and revenue in the Legislature usually means opposing or seeking amendments on bills backed by powerful interests. Thus “No” votes and abstentions on bills the League is opposed to often carry more weight.
4. Democrats author all the bills on this list. Few Republican-authored bills make it through the process. Democrats control at least two-thirds of the votes in each house and the flow of legislation on all committees. Democrats have 27 out of 40 seats in the Senate and 55 out of 80 seats in the Assembly. This means that the Democrats can pass bills without needing Republican votes. It also means that not all Democrats need to vote for majority-vote bills.
5. Republican members, who often score well on local control issues, have lower percentages in the League’s 2017 vote record. This result also reflects the dominant issues of the year, with major bills involving tax and debt issuance votes.

Ways to Use This Document

- Have a conversation with your legislator about the 2017 Session and include the vote record as part of that conversation. If your legislator has a good record, thank them. Consider passing a resolution of commendation. They deserve it.
- If your legislator’s vote record is weak, ask them why. Members often try to find ways of helping while avoiding bucking leadership or a powerful sponsor. Ask your legislator what else you should take into account.
- Evaluate the conversation. Is there a reliable commitment for a continued or improved level of responsiveness to their city’s issues?
- For elected city officials that provide legislative endorsements, consider whether or not the legislator merits your support. With the top-two primary, these endorsements are more valuable than ever.

Legislation Included on League 2017 Vote Record

Legislation Supported by the League

ACA 5 (Frazier) Transportation Funding: Constitutional Protection

Governor’s Action: Placed on Ballot

This measure provides constitutional protection to several new revenue sources included in SB 1 (Beall), the transportation funding package, to be used only for transportation purposes.

AB 22 (Bonta) Storing and Recording Electronic Media

Governor's Action: Signed

Allows local governments to use cloud-based storage for archival documentation purposes.

AB 73 (Chiu) Planning and Zoning: Housing Sustainability Districts

Governor's Action: Signed

Allows a city or county to create a housing sustainability district to complete upfront zoning and environmental review in order to receive incentive payments for development projects that are consistent with the district's ordinance.

AB 1408 (Calderon) Crimes: Supervised Release

Governor's Action: Vetoed

Would have provided a range of important reforms associated with managing the population of ex-offenders who are subject to post-release community supervision, to enhance public safety in communities.

AB 1505 (Bloom) Inclusionary Zoning: Rental Housing

Governor's Action: Signed

Clarifies and strengthens local authority to enact inclusionary rental housing programs in accordance with their police power in an effort to address the shortage of affordable housing.

SB 1 (Beall) Transportation Funding Package

Governor's Action: Signed

Provides an additional \$5.4 billion annually for the state and local transportation system, of which \$1.5 billion is dedicated to city and county street and road repairs. For cities, it doubles the amount of road maintenance funds they will receive to fix their streets.

SB 2 (Atkins) Building Homes and Jobs Act

Governor's Action: Signed

Creates an ongoing source of affordable housing funding which will provide hundreds of millions of dollars per year for local planning, affordable housing, supportive housing, emergency shelters, transitional housing and other housing needs via a \$75 recordation fee on specified real estate documents. Seventy percent of available funding is directed to local governments.

SB 3 (Beall) Veterans and Affordable Housing Bond of 2018

Governor's Action: Signed

Authorizes a \$4 billion general obligation bond for placement on the November 2018 statewide ballot to fund affordable housing programs, infill infrastructure projects and the veteran's home ownership program (CalVet).

SB 5 (de León) California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2018

Governor's Action: Signed

Authorizes a \$4 billion bond for placement on the June 2018 ballot with major funding for parks, climate and environmental programs, and water. It includes \$200 million in per-capita grants for

park rehabilitation and improvement grants for local governments, \$725 million for safe neighborhood parks, and additional funding available to local governments through a variety of competitive grant programs.

SB 540 (Roth) Workforce Housing Opportunity Zones

Governor's Action: Signed

Streamlines the housing approval process by authorizing local governments to identify Workforce Housing Opportunity Zones, which would incentivize the development of workforce and affordable housing in areas close to jobs, transit, and conform to California's greenhouse gas reduction laws.

Legislation Opposed by the League

AB 72 (Santiago) Powers of the Department of Housing and Community Development

Governor's Action: Signed

Provides the Department of Housing and Community Development (Department) with broad authority to review any action by a city or county that it determines is inconsistent with an adopted housing element.

SB 35 (Wiener) Housing Production and Approvals

Governor's Action: Signed

Requires multifamily developments consistent with existing local planning requirements that meet specific conditions to be approved in a "ministerial" fashion, meaning lacking project level environmental review and public input, within jurisdictions where housing is not developed for all income levels at sufficient volume to match state-generated regional housing need allocations.

SB 649 (Hueso) Wireless Telecommunications Facilities

Governor's Action: Vetoed

Would have eliminated local control over the leasing of publicly owned infrastructure, environmental and design review, public input, and the ability of local agencies to ensure broad deployment of new technology to underserved areas associated with the installation of "small cell" wireless equipment on taxpayer-funded property.
